WE UNDERSTAND.

- We understand there is never a good time to run a bond issue or financially impact patrons. We do not have a crystal ball on the economy or where our state is heading, but we do know this: there is a need in our community. Our students deserve the best learning environment to set them up for a successful future.
- Whether the bond passes or fails, we respect your right to vote – we are here to provide factual information on needs. We are still neighbors and will continue to be a part of our great community – and no doubt, will strive for our community to grow and prosper.

COMPLIANCE IS KEY.

We cannot simply renovate the 1954 gym and add bleachers.

The 1954 gym is functionally obsolete, not just outdated. It has serious deficiencies: non-compliant seating, no ADA accessibility, no fire sprinklers, and a court that fails to meet current safety and size standards.

Renovating it as a gym would trigger costly code upgrades to address these issues. Even then, we are left with the same undersized "box," with inadequate side and end court clearances and overall court length. It is unsafe for students to practice in a gym without the required minimum space.

A NEW GYM IS THE FISCALLY RESPONSIBLE APPROACH.

We have evaluated multiple options for the 1954 gym, including complete demolition. After years of analysis, the most fiscally responsible solution is to repurpose the space into much-needed classrooms. This approach directly addresses critical needs within our school district.

THE NEW GYM ADDITION PROVIDES ESSENTIAL SPACES FOR OUR STUDENTS:

- **Locker Rooms:** Ours are outdated and out of compliance.
- **Weight Room:** The existing room is undersized and unsafe. Students are lifting weights in the door vestibule, which is neither safe nor ADA compliant.
- **Wrestling Deck:** Our school is not compliant with Title IX. The NSAA officially sanctioned girls' wrestling as a separate sport beginning in the 2021-2022 school year, requiring equal access to training, competition, and championships. This addition ensures compliance by providing equitable facilities and resources for both boys' and girls' programs

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS:

- Neither the 1954 gym or the 1978 Gym allows for multiple courts. Having the ability to run multiple courts in each gym gives the ability to host more tournaments.
- Keeping students and families from traveling to play and generating revenue for the school.

SAFETY AND SECURITY OF STUDENTS:

- Having a separate Activity Entrance reduces the safety concern of outsiders entering and wandering around the school. The new gym can be used for community events and generate revenue while students are in session with the location and ability to lock down corridors leading to learning spaces.
- Centralizing education spaces (by turning the old gym into classrooms) creates a more focused learning environment for students and staff.
- Our school is landlocked. With limited space available, cost analysis has guided key improvements to student circulation and site safety. These include adding parking on the south side of the school and relocating the playground away from the road to a less public, more secure setting.

REPURPOSING 1954 GYM CREATES THE NEED FOR A SECOND GYM

- Allows better flexibility for academics within the school day for K-12 Physical Education as well as other class activities which require more space.
- Allows after school practices for multiple activities to be scheduled concurrently which gets our kids back home at a reasonable time for family time
- Currently One Acts must set up and tear down multiple times during their rehearsals due to the 1978 gym being used in multiple of ways. A second gym will allow for the set to stay intact – giving students more time to rehearse and not set up/tear down.
- Data has shown that kids who participate in extra-curricular activities perform better academically.

THE NEED IS NOW.

It simply does not matter if DG Fuels comes or not.

We must take care of our current students – the need is here without DG Fuels.

We are being proactive with limited information. If the bond fails, we won't be prepared IF DG Fuels arrives – construction is a process and the school will be limited on time and ability to accept students within the cap rate.

TAX IMPACT WILL NOT BE FELT THIS YEAR.

- Based on the construction timeline the board will more than likely issue around half the bonds in 2026 and the other half in 2027 as needed. This would mean the first half of the bond taxes would be set next September and wouldn't be taxed until 2027 while the second half wouldn't be taxed until 2028 giving some time for certain areas of the economy to improve.
- Bond rates are preliminary at this time and have fluctuated somewhat during the community engagement process. As Fed rates just decreased last week and are projected to decrease two more times this year and four times next year, the actual interest rates we will have on our bonds could be lower than all current projections.
- It is our hope that our agricultural economy will continue to improve over the next few years and lessen the burden of impact throughout the lifespan of this bond.

OUR BOARD IS FISCALLY RESPONSIBLE.

While other schools have raised issues with financing, your school board has worked tirelessly to create the best learning environment with the least amount of impact to the district.

If the bond passes and urgent facility needs are addressed, the board's intention is to try and use more option dollars towards reducing the General Fund levy to offset the bond payment.

The board has completed cost analysis studies to address the needs that were identified and discussed with the community.

We've taken an efficient approach to this new gym space with a pre-engineered metal building structure which is more economical than options such as masonry and pre-cast concrete.

LOOMIS DOES NOT QUALIFY FOR A CONSOLIDATION.

We are building for our current students, and consolidation is not on the table.

Consolidation must be a district vote or a school must fail to meet Rule 10 over a consecutive number of years.

If for two consecutive years the fall school district membership, or for two consecutive years the average daily membership, of an existing Class I, II, or III school district is fewer than forty-five students in grades kindergarten through twelve as determined by the Commissioner of Education, such school district shall, except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, be dissolved pursuant to the procedures described in subdivision (3)(b) of this section through the order of the state committee if the school district is within fifteen miles on a reasonably improved highway of another school. *

Loomis is currently rated as an **EXCELLENT** school with the Nebraska Department of Education with no plans to consolidate.**

OUR FACILITY TIES TO STUDENT & STAFF RECRUITMENT

- Families consider the condition of facilities when choosing where to live or opt their kids into school.
- A deteriorating or undersized school can lead to out-migration or option-out enrollment,
- Loomis currently attracts a notable number of option-in students, which supports its funding and diversity. Improved facilities can help maintain that base.
- Facilities attract teachers. Teacher shortage is a real thing, and schools compete for critical educators – updated facilities and modern learning spaces help recruit needed staff to our school which often bring more students from their family.

UNDERSTANDING ISS (IN-SCHOOL SUSPENSION) ROOMS:

Why Schools Have ISS Rooms:

- Provide structured consequences without removing students from the school environment.
- Support student accountability while keeping them engaged in their academic work and minimize lost instructional time compared to out-of-school suspension.
- Offer a controlled, supervised setting for students to reflect on behavior and reset.
- Allow for intervention and support, such as counseling, behavior coaching, or restorative practices.

ISS ROOMS ARE NOT A SIGN OF ONGOING STUDENT MISBEHAVIOR:

- The presence of an ISS room is proactive, not reactive—it's about having a tool available if needed.
- Most students do not regularly use ISS; it's a temporary support, not a permanent solution.
- Having an ISS room reflects a school's commitment to keeping students connected to learning, even during disciplinary actions.

We must remember that ISS Rooms are part of a flexible school facility. These rooms are also used for a wide range of school resources including but not limited to:

- Small Meeting Rooms
- Title and Life Skills Programs
- Sensory Rooms
- Testing Spaces
- Mother's Nursing Rooms

As of the end of September, all 3 Lady Wolves teams are sitting right at the 500 mark. The Reserves are 3-3, Junior Varsity is 4-4 and the Varsity is sitting with a 10-9 record. The first part of the season has been spent trying out and adjusting to different rotations. As they settle in, the girls are becoming more and more confident and the teamwork and trust are building with each match.

A few highlights include our home 9/11 tournament, where the girls went 2-1 on the day bringing home 3rd place. They also played very impressive matches at their home FKC Tri vs ranked SEM and Elm Creek sweeping both in straight sets. A 5-set thriller in Arapahoe at the end of September pushed the girls to their limits and they persevered through with determination to come back from being down 2 sets to 1 to win the last 2 sets handily. That game saw our defensive play step up and our hitters play aggressively, allowing Sophia Schemper to break the Assists in a Match School Record. The record was last set in 2023 by Brooklyn Wiese with 43 assists and Sophia now holds the spot with 54. The girls do a great job of rising to the challenge and competing aggressively against competitive teams. However, they've had a few set backs on matches when an aggressive pace isn't set at the start of the match. They are excited to push into October where we have a busy run including our Pink Out match on October 2nd, followed by Homecoming week which will include Parents Night vs Hershey on October 7th and Senior Night on our Homecoming vs Bertrand on October 10th. The very competitive Fort Kearny Conference Tournament will start October 13th where the girls are ready to make a run. Then subdistricts will be right around the corner starting October 27th.

The Loomis Wolves have had a great start to their season so far! The Wolves are 4-1 and their lone loss came against Anselmo-Merna 48-46. 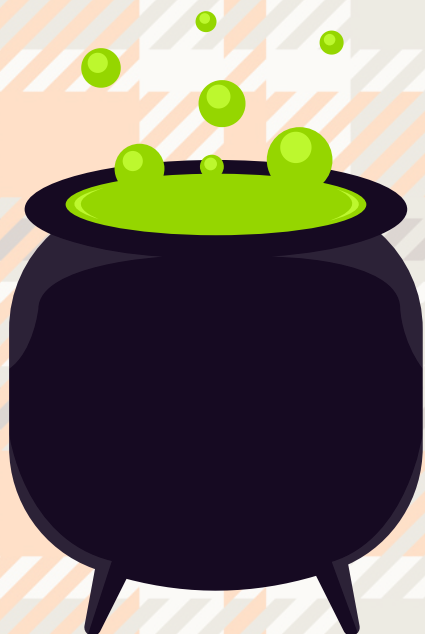
